GENERAL INFORMATION

GENERAL CONDUCT

Student Expectations: Students have very high expectations placed on them and are expected to follow them. In a program of this size it is impossible for the director or staff to micromanage every student. Therefore, the students will be required to follow these listed expectations.

1. Be early to every rehearsal and performance (“To be on time is to be late!”)
2. Have all materials at each rehearsal and performance.
3. Do not curse or use any foul or offensive language during any event, practice, or travel involving the band.
4. Know your music - Practice EVERY day.
5. Rehearsals are conducted in a quiet, professional manner. Absolutely no talking will be permitted or allowed on the field or in the band room during rehearsals. Raise your hand and wait to be recognized by Mr. Stansberry or any staff member before speaking.
6. Keep hands and feet to yourself – No horse play or messing around.
7. No chewing gum (color guard and percussion included) during rehearsals or performances.
8. No food or drinks are allowed in the Band Room – Water only
9. Do not wear hats indoors at any time.
10. Respect others and their equipment – if it does not belong to you, do not touch it without permission.
11. Complete assignments by the assigned date.
12. Put equipment and materials in their assigned space after rehearsal or performance – keep the band room clean – it’s your second home!
13. Absolutely no disrespect to the Director, any staff member, chaperone, or any other parent volunteer will be tolerated.
14. Focus and pay attention during all rehearsals and performances.
15. Students are expected to sit in the chairs correctly and use stands only for music. Do not lean on stands or put extraneous stress on the stands. Also, do not put your feet on the stands or chairs.
16. All Students are expected and encouraged to participate in Fundraising.
17. Students are expected to leave friends, and any other non-band students, outside the band room.
18. Students should not display public affection in the band room.
19. Cell phones and pagers are not allowed to be on while rehearsing or performing.
20. The use of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco are prohibited at any function involving the band.
21. Weapons, explosives, fireworks, etc. are prohibited as well.
22. There will be NO inappropriate posting or messaging on social media sites.
23. Students will RESPECT other teachers, administrators, and staff of all of Legacy High School. No disrespecting teachers or talking back or arguing is allowed.
24. Students must be dressed in School Dress Code at all Band events during the school day or outside of class. Students must be in Dress Code for EVERY rehearsal and performance.
25. COMMUNICATE with your parents. Make sure they know when and where to pick you up after performances, contests, and practices.

Regulations and Common Sense: Band members should protect their standing in school and in the band by observing the following. Failure to observe these regulations may result in severe consequences.

1. All rules stated in the Legacy High School Student handbook and discipline management plan also apply to all band events, both during and outside of school time. Failure to follow the rules will result, depending upon the seriousness of the offense, extra practice sessions after school and/or removal from the performing unit temporarily or permanently.
2. Protect your bus privilege by remaining seated at all times while the bus is in motion, not eating or drinking at any time while in the bus, avoiding loud distracting noises that could endanger safe driving. Follow all rules set forth by the bus drivers and transportation dept.
3. Disrespect in any form to the director or any adult working with our organization will result in severe consequences.
4. The most important rule of all: **Use common sense**, and always act in a manner reflecting the pride of The Legacy High School Band! Listen to the director, staff, boosters, drum majors, section leaders, and follow directions. **THINK** before you act!
5. **CONDUCT CLAUSE:** Any member of the LHS Band program who displays conduct unbecoming of a band member may be removed from the band program. This includes unexcused absences, failing grades, suspensions, discipline issues, other attendance issues, improper conduct, etc.

MARCHING REHEARSAL CONDUCT

Even though some rehearsals are outside of the school day, all school rules still apply, as well as the ones listed below.

Food: It is recommended that you eat something before the beginning of the afternoon rehearsal. Please remember that food high in carbohydrates will cause you to become nauseated during an extended period of activity. Do not eat hamburgers, hot dogs, candy, etc. Soft drinks should not be consumed at this time either because it will make you thirstier. You are highly encouraged to bring food that will keep your energy level up during an extended rehearsal. These include fruits such as bananas, apples, oranges, or granola bars and crackers. Please understand you will be expected to take care of yourself, since part of the developmental process is comprehension of what your body needs to be most effective. It is recommended that you drink plenty of water the night before and the day of any rehearsal or performance. Also, have water on hand during the rehearsal for consumption during breaks or you may have the water on your person (camelbacks are acceptable and recommended) throughout rehearsal. No water will be provided at rehearsal – you **MUST** bring your own water to each rehearsal.

Meal Plan: During the season, meals will be provided on Saturdays, before games, at contests, etc. for a fee. The meal fee for this year is \$100. We will not be able to have students pay on a per meal basis, so this needs to be prepaid in order for student to receive the meal.

Clothes: Clothes that are distracting should not be worn. The school dress code is still in effect at all after school rehearsals and performances. Everyone must wear a shirt at all times. The length of shorts must not be so short as to draw unnecessary attention. Low top tennis shoes must be worn at all times. Do not wear sandals or flip-flops to any rehearsal. Pants that drag on the ground should not be worn. Marching at fast tempos in such pants may cause a fall or injury. If it is raining/snowing or forecasted to, please dress appropriately - no white shirts – we will still rehearse! Another thing to keep in mind is that at some rehearsals you will be expected to look in the direction of the sun and it would be a good idea to have a hat or a sun visor and/or sunglasses (hats or sunglasses may not be worn inside the building).

(Miscellaneous, Continued)

Bring to the Field: Bring your instrument, music, drill charts, and any other necessary supplies. You should also bring your own water bottle. You will need to write your first and last name in BOLD LETTERS, with a permanent marker on the bottle so it will not get mixed up or lost. Also, bring sun screen so that you do not get burnt. Mosquitoes can sometimes be a problem and West Nile Virus is always a concern - Always wear Insect repellent when outdoors.

Miscellaneous: Throughout the entire marching season many tasks must be accomplished that are just as important as the music and drill. If a student does not pay attention to these items, there is no way he/she can be successful in the LHS Band Program. The items listed here are just a few:

- **Attitude** is one of the most important parts of a successful band student. The student who is always willing to give 110% and display a positive attitude has a place in the LHS Band.
- **Unnecessary talking** in any rehearsal or performance is not permitted. With 140 students receiving instruction at one time abiding by the talking policy becomes essential for the student's and the band's success.
- **For a successful rehearsal each student must come prepared for success.** This means that you will need to bring necessary items listed above.
- Many students will be assigned a **crew job** at some time during the year. How you complete this job is very important to you and the band's success.
- **Correct and proper care** of your marching band uniform and your instrument is also very essential.
- **Cell phones and pagers are to be turned OFF during all rehearsals and performances.** If parents need to reach their students, please call the band room (720) 972-6817 or the main office at (720) 972-6700.

PERFORMANCES

- Attendance at ALL performances is MANDATORY for ALL participating members. Performances include, but are not limited to, ALL football games, parades, concerts and contests for the entire year for each ensemble.
- Be early to all performances so that you can get into uniform and get yourself prepared. Attendance will be taken and uniform checks will be performed.
- **Any member who has not arranged an excused late arrival with Mr. Stansberry will not be allowed to perform, resulting in an unexcused absence for that performance and possible removal from the performing group.**
- Non-Band members are not permitted to sit with the Band at performances or contests. Chaperones are excluded. Non-Band members are asked to remain outside of the Band Room at all times.
- During performances of other ensembles or bands be considerate, attentive, and courteous of their performance. If you are asked to leave a performance due to inappropriate behavior, it will result in an unexcused absence from the performance and possible removal from the performing group.
- Once you are seated, remain in your seat and do not get up and move around. If you absolutely must use the restroom, **do not get up during a performance or between movements or songs. Wait until the performing ensemble or group has finished their complete performance to get up.**

(Performances, Continued)

- No books, magazines, papers, walkmans, ipods or sleeping, etc. will be permitted at any performance or contest.
- If students are sitting in the audience, they should be absolutely still and quiet during performances.
- All cell phones and pagers should be turned OFF during all performances while in the audience. Absolutely NO cell phones or pagers are allowed on stage.
- If a student must leave with their parent or guardian from a performance and not ride with the Legacy Band, the parent or guardian should write a note to Mr. Stansberry before the performance. Then, Mr. Stansberry MUST see the parent or guardian and release the student to them.
- Students should be picked up promptly after performances.

UNIFORMS

Pride in appearance should be maintained at all times. Any item that draws undue attention or distracts from the cleanliness of the uniform or performing group will need to be covered or altered while in uniform. We are presenting an image at all times and want to always look professional and distinct and have the focus on the team's performance and not individuals. Follow all rules listed below when in partial or full uniform.

- Band members, while in uniform, should remain in FULL UNIFORM at all times. The only exception is when permission is given to use a "partial" uniform dress as outlined by the director.
- No hats or sunglasses may be worn while you are dressed in any uniform.
- Earrings may not be worn while in uniform (both boys and girls). If earrings are not removable, they may be covered up with flesh colored band-aids only.
- No jewelry may be worn or visible while in partial or full uniform including necklaces, bracelets, watches, rings, nose rings, belly button rings, etc.
- No nail polish other than clear is allowed while in partial or full uniform.
- No lipstick (other than clear) may be worn by marching performing members (Color Guard excluded).
- Tattoos are not to be visible. All tattoos must be covered with flesh colored band-aids only.
- Dyed hair, other than natural colors (Natural Red, Brown, Black, or Blonde) is not allowed while in partial or full uniform.
- Facial hair must be maintained and clean cut while in uniform.
- No consumption of food or drink while in full uniform is allowed. Water is acceptable. Food and drink may be permitted when in partial uniform, but only when the director indicates that it is acceptable.
- Shirts must be tucked in at all times while in partial uniform.
- Any student with hair that reaches to the top of the neckline of the uniform or longer will need to put it up in their hats using hairpins or a hairnet.

JAZZ BAND UNIFORMS

Jazz Band members will need to have black pants, black socks, black dress shoes, and a black shirt (to be determined by the Director). Students will need to purchase these items on their own.

TRAVEL GUIDELINES

When the band travels, we are again representing the band, school, city, county, state, etc. Our image will be noticed wherever we go and whatever we do. Remember to act with the band in mind. The following rules must be adhered to:

- Band members are required to use school transportation, or other arranged transportation provided by the band, to all scheduled events. Under no circumstances may a band member use any other transportation without prior approval of the director.
- Students must follow all rules of the Adams 12 transportation department or other bus company while utilizing their equipment.
- Students must be conscious of the rules of hotels, airplanes, or any other means of housing or travel while traveling with the band. Students must respect all facilities we visit and utilize.
- Students must respect all private property of others on buses, planes, or hotel rooms and anywhere we may travel.
- While the bus or plane is moving, you must remain in your assigned seat.
- Attendance will be taken on buses and planes. Make sure you are quiet and attentive during this process.
- No playing instruments or beating sticks while on buses or planes or in any other inappropriate area.
- Always be considerate of those around you. No screaming or loud behavior will be permitted while traveling with the LHS bands.
- When traveling students will need to wear their Band Polo shirts and either khaki pants or shorts. All students must have a Band Polo shirt and will wear it when traveling.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

Anytime you will be absent from any outside rehearsal or performance, you need to fill out an **Excused Absence Request** form either 2 days before a rehearsal or 2 weeks before a performance. The following guidelines apply to after school rehearsals, contests, or any other performance by any of the ensembles. Absences and tardiness during the school day will be handled according to school policy and the director's discretion.

Excused Absence

- Excused Absences must be arranged with the director prior to their occurrence. Each absence will be handled on an individual basis, and should fall under one of the following categories (work and vacations are not excused):
 1. Family Emergencies
 2. Medical Emergencies
 3. School Related Events (Powder Puff will not be excused as a school related activity if it conflicts with a band rehearsal or performance)
- If you have any excused absence from any rehearsal, you will have to make up the time missed or a portion of the time missed with a staff member or Mr. Stansberry in order to be approved to perform at the next performance. If this time is not made up, you will **not** be allowed to perform in the next performance.
- If you have excessive excused absences then you may not be allowed to perform. However, if the absences are excused, you will be given the opportunity to make up the grade for the performance.

(Attendance and Punctuality, Continued)

Unexcused Absence

- One unexcused absence from a mandatory rehearsal in one week will result in the student not participating at the next performance and possible removal from the group.

Tardiness to Rehearsals

- If you are not in your warm up position or assigned position by the time rehearsal is scheduled to begin, you are tardy.
- An excused tardy will be decided through the Excused Absence Request form.
- If a student knows they will be tardy, they should fill out an **Excused Absence Request**.
- If a student does not have a pre-approved excuse (by way of the Excused Absence Request), appropriate consequences will be incurred.
- If a student misses more than half of a rehearsal and does not have a valid excuse via the **Excused Absence Request**, the tardy becomes an unexcused absence and the student will not be able to march in the next performance.

Emergencies

- Emergencies sometimes cannot be avoided. If there is someone at rehearsal who does not have a marching spot (shadow), they may march the spot the remainder of the rehearsal unless the staff or director states differently.
- If an emergency does occur, do your best to contact the Band Room at (720) 972-6817 and leave a message.
- Upon returning from the emergency, fill out an **Excused Absence Request** with a note from your parents/guardians.

Leaving Early from Rehearsal

- If there is any reason you should ever have to leave rehearsal early, you must fill out an **Excused Absence Form** and bring a note signed by one of your parents and give it to Mr. Stansberry before rehearsal begins.
- If you leave a rehearsal and then return for whatever reason, you must also fill out an **Excused Absence Request** and the time must be made up after rehearsal with a Section Leader, staff member, or Mr. Stansberry if your absence is excused.
- Leaving from Rehearsal early without an excused absence request and approval will be considered an unexcused absence and the student will not perform at the next performance.

Tardiness and/or Absence from a Performance

- This should not be a problem with the LHS Band. If this ever becomes an issue, Mr. Stansberry will meet with the parents and/or principals to find a solution which may include removal from the performing group.

SCHOOL-OWNED PROPERTY

All band members are entrusted with school-owned property including: instruments, music, uniforms, props, folders, etc. Loss or damage (beyond normal wear and tear) will require the student to reimburse the school district for replacement or repair of the item. Anyone found to have mistreated, damaged, or destroyed any part of the facility, instruments or other property will be handled by the director and administration of Legacy High School. School instruments taken home for practice should be reported on your homeowner's insurance policy in case of theft or severe damage. In the case of uniforms, separate instructions are issued with each uniform outlining care. Students that use school instruments or equipment on a daily basis will need to pay a rental fee of \$50.00 for the entire year or \$25.00 per semester. This fee will go toward repair and cleaning of this instrument each summer.

GRADES

Grades in band classes are based upon daily participation, readiness to learn, and performances as assigned. See each specific class syllabus for the detailed grading policy for each class. Eligibility is determined on a weekly basis and applies only to Colorado High School Activities Association (CHSAA) sponsored events such as All-State Band, All-State Choir, All-State Orchestra, CHSAA Solo & Ensemble Festivals, and some College & University Honor Groups.

SCHOOL ELIGIBILITY POLICY

Legacy High School has a school eligibility policy for ALL extra-curricular activities. Winter Guard and Winter Percussion will be subject to eligibility checks throughout the season. If a student carries 2 F's in any classes for 4 weeks, they will be removed from all events/activities until passing. Any student with 2 F's at the time of tryouts will not be allowed to audition, try-out, or hold any leadership position. Students are expected to maintain 90% school attendance. Students must be in class the day of and after any event. It will be up to the instructors of these ensembles to determine if they will implement a more strict policy and this policy will be outlined at the annual parent meeting for each ensemble.

PREPARATION OF MUSIC

Students will be required, during marching season, to memorize the music that is to be performed on the field. Students will be tested on their memorization and musicality of performance. Students will be required to pass all of their music before they can perform or compete with the band. Students are also responsible for practicing all stand (football game) music or any other music that they receive in any ensemble in which they are involved. If students have questions, they should see their respective section leader, a staff member, or Mr. Stansberry.

SHADOW/ALTERNATE SYSTEM

The following guidelines have been created to give the members of the Legacy High School Marching Band information on marching positions and shadow positions. Due to the difficulty of learning to perform our marching show, we try to set each marching position as soon as possible. Marching band is an activity that requires you to learn your part at school, during the summer rehearsals, and at the after school rehearsals. You cannot learn your part of the drill for the show at home. Along with learning the drill we must also set balance and visual staging designs. Due to these factors, a student may be assigned a shadow position for any of the following reasons:

- Not attending Summer Band Camps or missing Mandatory August Band Camps.
- More than 1 unexcused absence from a regular after school sectional or rehearsal, or has any unexcused absence from a performance. Mr. Stansberry will make the final decision about whether a student can march or not due to unexcused absences.
- Does not have the maturity (including, but not limited to rehearsal etiquette, talking, attitude, etc.) to discipline themselves to maintain the schedule and guidelines stated in this handbook.
- Inability to maintain a high level of marching proficiency at all times.
- Inability to learn the music and be able to play and march at the same time.

Students will be evaluated throughout the summer during rehearsals and their individual progress and dedication will be tracked. Shadow status will be determined before the MANDATORY August band camps. Mr. Stansberry and the staff will then constantly be evaluating all of the students throughout the Marching season to make decisions on shadow status.

“FUN”DRAISING AND THE FUNDRAISING GOAL

The band booster budget is projected at just under \$100,000 this year. This amount is necessary to obtain the level of competition and success that the Legacy High School Band students deserve. It is possible to run the band on the allotted district budget, but there will be no extra help or other experiences for the students outside of the school day. They will not be able to realize their full potential or gain the recognition they are more than capable of receiving. Therefore, it should be the desire of each student and family to participate in fundraising in some way, shape, or form. Students and families are given many opportunities throughout the entire year to participate in several fundraisers and will have every opportunity to help earn the projected budget needed to obtain the band's goals.

Fundraising allows many things for the students, such as the following:

1. Students are able to participate in many memorable experiences not afforded by the allotted district budget, such as participating in more contests, traveling to contests in and out of state, experiencing other musical and cultural events both locally, nationally, and internationally.
2. Salaries for the Instructors. Students are able to receive more specialized instruction at a lower student to teacher ratio (it is impossible for one director to give individual attention to over 170 students).
3. Students are able to travel to and from some events in private charter buses.
4. Students are able to receive more up-to-date music in all ensembles.
5. Students receive access to better instruments and other accessories needed for successful performance.
6. Students get a memorable band banquet experience at the end of the year.
7. Students are able to perform a more competitive Marching program through more personalized and custom arranged music and marching drill.
8. Students will get their uniforms cleaned.
9. Students will get their instruments transported to and from games and contests.
10. This list goes on and on...

Fundraisers also allow many things for the parents:

1. Parents can help their students reach a goal.
2. Parents can spend time with their student, seeing them do something they love.
3. Parents can get involved with a successful program.
4. Parents can form a network with other parents and life-long friends.
5. Parents can get to know other students and work with some of the best students in the state!
6. Parents get to have fun and know they are helping a great cause!!!

(Fundraising, Continued)

Overall, the students have a better, more productive, memorable, and successful experience in the band program if fundraising occurs. Therefore, in order to achieve this potential, each band student should have the goal to fundraise or donate to the band program the amount the boosters deem necessary to achieve the projected budget. If your student is not involved in a marching ensemble (Marching Band, Winter Percussion or Winter Guard) the fundraising goal will be less. These funds are used to pay the general expenses approved by the Band Boosters that are not covered by Legacy High School. The majority of expenses go toward instructional fees, but other expenses also include equipment, entry fees, transportation, uniforms, bank charges, and administrative costs, etc. Each student and family can achieve their fundraising goal either via direct payment or through the many fundraising opportunities provided by the Boosters. It is an expectation that each student and family will participate in fundraising or direct payment, so that the bands can realize their full potential!!! Also, family members or friends are all encouraged to assist the students in reaching their fundraising goal and may participate in fundraisers for a designated student.

A portion of the money raised through fundraising activities (e.g. Invesco, Broomfield Event Center, Scrip, etc.) will go towards the General Band Fund, and the rest will be tracked as Individual Student Activity (ISA) record. Until a student's fundraising goal is met, Individual Student Activity is credited towards the fundraising goal; thereafter it will remain in the student's ISA record, where it can be applied towards other Band-related expenses. All requests to use ISA credits for a Band-related expense must be submitted in writing to the Finance team via the "Request to use ISA" Form. ISA balances will carryover from year-to-year and may be passed on to younger siblings who join the Band program. Any student who graduates, is removed from the Band program, or quits will forfeit their ISA. Details on ISA management can be found in the ISA Overview document.

Donated goods or materials may be credited toward the student's fundraising goal if the items were budgeted expenses. Contact the Finance team for further details and to explore this option if interested.

If a student brings in a Corporate Sponsorship, that sponsorship can be credited towards the student's fundraising goal. Contact the Finance team for details on our Corporate Sponsorship program.

During trip years, it is very beneficial for the student and family to participate in fundraising so that they may contribute to their Individual Student Activity and use it to help offset the costs of a band trip. If the fundraising goals or donations are met for each family in the program, the students will then be able to reach their fullest potential!!!

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC CLASSES

REQUIRMENTS TO BE IN THE HIGH SCHOOL BANDS

Membership in any of the Legacy High School bands is a privilege. It is required that you have been in band and played your instrument for at least 2 years before auditioning. Mr. Stansberry will listen to those wishing to be in the Legacy High School Bands and will make the final decision on membership.

CONFLICT WITH OTHER SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Band members participating in more than one school related activity must assume the responsibility of BOTH. This means reporting any conflicts in scheduling to the director well in advance of the date. This allows the director time to work with everyone involved to reach a resolution to everyone's advantage. Failure to do this and not showing up to a band event due to a conflict will result in an unexcused absence and the consequences thereof. Please see Mr. Stansberry with any concerns and he will handle them on a case-to-case basis and arrive at a solution that is suitable for all parties.

SCHEDULING

It is important to have consistency within the band program. It is possible to take band all year long every year you are in high school and still finish all other requirements. You must decide for yourself that you will commit to finding a way to make it work. To do this it would be beneficial for you to place music on your schedule first and then find a way to work in everything else. It is impossible to build a successful band program if students are not consistently in the classes, which provide instruction on how to get better on their instruments and music. Mr. Stansberry will help you with any scheduling conflicts and will work with all parties involved to reach a solution.

WIND SYMPHONY

The Wind Symphony is formed at the end of marching season. Auditions are held for chair placement. This ensemble is an advanced course and will involve students who are highly proficient on their instruments. The course requires serious dedication and practice. Rehearsals are held during school with sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics being scheduled regularly outside of the school day. Attendance at extra sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics is MANDATORY. The Wind Symphony also performs at a number of concerts and competitions throughout the school year. Attendance for concerts and competitions is also mandatory.

SYMPHONIC BAND

The symphonic band is formed at the end of marching season. Auditions are held for chair placement. This ensemble is an intermediate course and will involve students who are very proficient on their instruments. The course requires dedication and practice. Rehearsals are held during school with sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics being scheduled outside of the school day. Attendance at extra sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics is MANDATORY. The Symphonic Band also performs at several concerts and competitions throughout the school year. Attendance for concerts and competitions is also mandatory.

CONCERT BAND

The Concert Band is also formed at the end of marching season and is comprised of students not in Wind Symphony or Symphonic Band. Auditions will determine placement in all ensembles. Rehearsals are held during school with extra sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics being scheduled from time to time outside of the school day. Attendance at extra sectionals, rehearsals, and clinics is mandatory. The Concert Band also performs at concerts and competitions throughout the school year. Attendance for concerts and competitions is also mandatory.

MARCHING BAND

The marching band is open to students who display a highly proficient standard of music and marching performance as accepted by the instructional staff. Practices begin at the beginning of the summer and last throughout the summer. Marching season continues throughout the first quarter of the school year. During the fall, the marching band typically rehearses on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays after school (if there is no football game) and Saturday's all day when there is no contest. Percussion and Color Guard will set any extra rehearsals with Instructors. Also, sectionals will be held for 45 minutes at least once a week. Performances for the Marching Band include but are not limited to all home varsity football games, pep rallies, parades, and marching competitions throughout the season. Please see the full calendar at www.legacybands.org for any and all updated information concerning dates, times, and venues. The calendar on the website is the most up-to-date and accurate source of schedules.

JAZZ BAND

There are 2 jazz bands that meet each day of school. Jazz Band I and Jazz Band II membership are determined by audition. In order to participate in either of the Jazz Bands, you must also be registered for Symphonic or Concert Band (excluding rhythm section).

PEP BAND

Pep band is an extra-curricular unit of Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band, Concert Band, and both Jazz Bands. Students who volunteer for this duty will be required to perform at a number of basketball games and pep rallies designated by the director. Rehearsals will be after school or before events.

COLOR GUARD/WINTERGUARD

Any student in the school is eligible to be in the Color Guard. The Color Guard performs as an auxiliary unit to the Marching Band during the marching season and as an independent unit during the Winter Guard competitions. Practices are held both during school time and outside of school time.

PERCUSSION SECTION

The Percussion section performs as a part of the Marching Band, part of the Wind Symphony, Symphonic and Concert Bands, and as an individual unit for Winter Percussion competitions. Practices are held both during school time and outside of school time. You must be a member of the Wind Symphony, Symphonic Band or Concert Band in order to be eligible to be a part of the Winter Percussion Ensemble (Guitar, Bass, and Piano players excluded).

ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

As a member of the Legacy High School Band, the following opportunities become available. Band members are encouraged to take advantage of as many of the activities below as possible to achieve their musical potential. The more opportunities each student takes advantage of, the better they become as individual musicians, which in turn benefits the entire band program.

Private Lessons: Students are highly, highly, highly encouraged to seek the valuable help of private instruction on their instrument (see the included list of private lesson teachers in this handbook). For the convenience of students and parents, private lessons can be arranged at school both during and outside of school time. There is a fee for each lesson. Lessons can be arranged at anytime during the school year as well as during the summer months. Those students wishing to be in Wind Symphony are highly encouraged to take private lessons. Please see the enclosed sheet containing contact information for lesson teachers. Private lessons may be paid for through ISA accounts. See Mr. Stansberry for details.

Solo/Ensemble: Students are encouraged to perform at the scheduled CHSAA solo/ensemble event during the school year. To assist the students wishing to participate in a solo/ensemble event, the director and/or private instructor will assist in music selection and preparation. This is an extremely important event for each instrumental music student each year. For the annual Solo Contest some solos will have an accompanist. See Mr. Stansberry if you require an accompanist. Students will be responsible for paying their accompanist for the rehearsals and competition. The student must sign up to enter the solo and ensemble contest.

State Honor Bands: Throughout the course of the school year, students will be offered the opportunity to audition for the All-State Band, other College Honor Bands, or All-State Jazz Band. The student will have assistance through the director and/or private instructor in preparing for such auditions. The student will have to sign up to enter each contest. Legacy Bands will pay for the entry fee. If the student backs out of the contest after the entry fee has been sent in the student will need to reimburse the fee to the band. If students make any of the honor or all-state ensembles, they will be responsible for hotel fees and all other fees associated with the participation in the ensemble. Also, students will need to be chaperoned by their parent or guardian for all Honor ensembles. Mr. Stansberry will chaperone the students to All-State Band and All-State Jazz Band. **All members of the Wind Symphony are REQUIRED to audition for at least 1 honor ensemble.**

Local Concerts & Performances: From time to time, students will be given information on local concerts by college and professional groups. Students are encouraged to expand their musical horizons through attending these events. Extra credit will be given to those students who retain their ticket and present it to Mr. Stansberry with their name on it. Also, points may be earned towards lettering.

Summer Camps: Information is made available every year on several area band camp and leadership camps. Most camps are open to all interested band members, regardless of experience level. Some offer tuition-free attendance through audition.

(Additional Opportunities, Continued)

College Placement/Scholarship: Graduating seniors in band are offered assistance in college selection. Financial help is offered through a variety of scholarship opportunities, both local and through a specific college. Music scholarships are a great way to help offset the high cost of attending college!

Trips: The band will travel out of the area often. Trips must be paid for by the student. There will be several fundraising opportunities each year to help students raise the money for trips. Students may use money from their ISA to help offset or pay for the trip. Students or parents may also pay for the trips through cash or checks.

POSSIBLE ADDITIONAL BAND EXPENSES:

As with any organization there are expenses that will be associated with participation. Some possible expenses that may be associated with being in the band program are (but not limited to):

- Show Shirts (for Marching Band only)
- Polo Shirts (everyone in the program needs one of these)

- Mouthpieces
- Valve Oil
- Slide Oil
- Batteries
- Lights (for Parade of Lights)
- Other Instrument Supplies
- Instrument repair fees
- Winter Guard fees
- Winter Percussion fees
- Uniform fees
- Black Socks (ankle length only)
- Jazz Uniforms
- Banquet fees
- Marching Band State Dinner fee
- Meal Plan fees
- Khaki pants
- Travel expenses/Trip Fees
- Books
- Music
- Dot books
- Marching Gloves
- Rain Gear
- Sunscreen
- Bug spray
- Notebooks, staff paper, etc.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

LEADERSHIP EXPECTATIONS

Students desiring to be a part of the Leadership Team within the band should first carefully consider the following: Being a leader takes TIME (outside of regular practice times); Attendance at special Leadership camps will be required throughout the summer. Students interested in any leadership position should consider if he/she has prepared adequately for such a role. Ask yourself these questions: Have you proved your personal commitment to this organization by meeting all expectations as a member? Have you done some TANGIBLE things to prepare you for this leadership role? (i.e.: All-State Band, solo/ensemble, etc.) Are you ready to make the personal sacrifices this position may entail? If so, read on...

LEADERSHIP POSITIONS AND DESCRIPTIONS

The following leadership positions assist in either the leadership and/or teaching of the Legacy High School Bands and shall be appointed by the director, staff, and judges, after appropriate auditions have been completed. Drum Majors, Color Guard Captains, and Section Leaders are chosen through competitive tryouts where specific information on how to prepare for tryouts is released 2-3 weeks before the tryout date. Appointment to these positions will be based on the judge's and staff's evaluations and recommendations.

Drum Majors: The Drum Majors assist in the teaching and organization of the marching band with other duties as assigned.

Section Leaders: Several positions are appointed by the directors to assist the band in a variety of ways as outlined by the Director. Section Leaders will have more responsibility and are expected to be early to and stay late for all rehearsals/performances.

Color Guard Captains: The guard officers assist in the teaching and organization of the Color Guard with other duties as assigned.

Librarian: The Librarian will help the Director maintain the library of music and make copies, etc. to prepare for rehearsals, etc.

Crew Jobs: Many students will be assigned a crew job at some time during the year. How you complete this job is very important to the band's success. These positions will be on a volunteer basis, but will require commitment for the entire year.

AWARDS AND LETTERING

AWARDS

The band director and staff will recognize the outstanding achievements of those students that have gone above and beyond the requirements and have proved themselves to be very successful band students. Students will receive plaques or certificates recognizing their award and will have their name placed on plaques in the band room to commemorate the honor. The awards will be presented at the annual Band Banquet at the end of the year. Some of the awards may include:

- John Philip Sousa Band Award
- The Director's Award
- Louis Armstrong Jazz Award

LETTERING

A letter should be a source of pride to each student. It represents the tremendous time, effort, and dedication a student has invested in the Legacy High School Band program. It should reward the student for efforts that are not graded in the classroom. The key element in any lettering program is that a student must spend extra time and effort in order to earn a letter. A letter that is granted merely for participating in the class lessens the value and meaning of the letter to all who receive the award. To letter in Band, the following conditions must first be met:

- Students must be enrolled in the ensemble for a minimum of 2 complete years. If a student transfers in, they must have proof of membership in a comparable high school ensemble from their former school.
- Students must maintain at least a B average each semester in the ensemble for which they are enrolled.
- Students must accumulate the necessary points as outlined below.
- All students, **regardless of receiving an automatic letter or not, must attend 3 Legacy High School Band, Choir, Orchestra, or Drama productions in which they are not performing (Programs with the students names printed on them must be turned in.)**.

Conditions that will forfeit eligibility to letter:

- Unexcused absence from any performance, contest, football game, etc.
- Any severe infraction of school or band policies.
- More than 2 unexcused absence from any mandatory or required rehearsals or sectionals.

Seniors will receive an automatic letter as long as the conditions above are met, and as long as they have been a member of the Band program for all four years of their high school career.

Juniors and Sophomores will be awarded a letter if **1500 points** are accumulated in one year. Points begin in June and are totaled the next Spring for that school year. Points DO NOT accumulate into the next school year.

In the spring of each year, the students will fill out a form which should track their progress towards a letter. Letters for Seniors, Juniors, or Sophomores will not be given without filling out the proper paperwork or having the proper documentation. **It is HIGHLY recommended that the students keep track of their involvement throughout the year so filling out the lettering form is easy.**

BAND BOOSTERS

The Band Boosters are one of the most important aspects of the Legacy High School Band Program. Without the Boosters, the band would not be able to afford many of the necessary amenities the band needs to function properly. The main objective of the Boosters is to support and promote the growth and development of the Legacy High School Band program and the involved students. The Boosters are a cooperative effort among the Band Director, Staff, Band Members and Members' Parents. Any and all dedication you can assume with the Band Boosters will not only benefit your child, but will also dually benefit the entire Band program. There are a number of ways you can help, but the best way is by volunteering. Here are just a few of the volunteer opportunities:

Fundraising:

Fundraisers are a constant on-going event throughout the year. Help is needed to disperse the information & products. Parents are always needed to help with every fundraiser. Please see a board member to see how you can help....and don't forget to order SCRIP!!!

Help Move Equipment:

The "pit" is the area in front of the Marching Band that doesn't march. The pit instruments need to be moved from the truck to the performance area during competitions & football games. This may also include any props. The students load and unload everything into and out of the truck, but you would help get it onto the field. This is also a very unique area to view the performances!

Chaperone:

Chaperones are needed to ride on the bus throughout the year to football games, competitions, performances, etc. and to travel on trips with the band.

Uniforms:

Help is needed when uniforms are fitted and when they are handed out for each performance. The fittings are done in the fall before marching season and then again after marching season, for the concert uniforms. Help is needed before and after dry cleaning also.

Meal Servers:

Occasionally when the band is having lunch or dinner served to them, help is needed. Also if we host a meal for a Drum Corps, Winter Percussion or Guard Judge lunches during a competition, or any other event where meals would be served, help is needed to make and serve the meal.

Carpentry and/or Sewing Skills:

Help is needed in building props, altering uniforms, sewing flags, making uniforms for winter guard and winter percussion, etc.

Equipment Maintenance:

Help is needed to make sure the instrument carts are in good shape, to make sure all bolts are in place and tight, etc. Any repairs to scaffolding or other equipment within the band room or that is used by any group of the band are also needed.

Videographer/Photographer:

Record competitions and events throughout the year, take pictures, etc. make end-of-year photo or video montage.

Website Design/Maintenance:

Any parent having website abilities may be needed to help maintain, upgrade, or design the band website.

Band Booster Board Position:

The Band Booster Board is comprised of parents and the director. These persons are responsible for making decisions about the program, budget, etc. for each year. Also, several Booster positions have individual committees needed to complete their position. Please see the positions on the next page and volunteer to become involved!

Marching Festival Volunteers:

The Legacy Marching Festival is in need of many volunteers and every family is expected to help in some way. In order for this festival to be a success, we will need everyone's help as this is one of the biggest fundraisers of the year. You may volunteer to be a Chairperson for one of the many tasks that will need to be performed. If you are not able to volunteer as a Chairperson, we will need help in other areas throughout the festival day. Please sign up to help after the Mandatory Parent Meeting.
